Group 1 – Who is the audience for "Letter"? How do you know? Be specific.

Group 2 – What, if any appeals, does King use in his letter? Identify 1-3 types of appeal and identify at least one specific example of each type of appeal you identify.

Group 3 – What is it that "they say," according to King? What are the main points "they" have made?

Group 4 – What is that King says? (King is the "I" in "Letter.") What are the main points "I" is making?

Each member of the expert group will be expected to take their group's conclusions to the next part of the activity.
